All About Brass

Funnily enough, the Brass Family got its name because the instruments are made of brass! These instruments can play louder than any other family in the orchestra. But not all instruments that are made of brass are in this family – the saxophone may look like a family member, but it's actually a woodwind instrument! Here are some fun facts about brass instruments...

instrument is shaped differently and the pipes are twisted and widened to create different sounds.

Brass instruments have a mouthpiece that the player blows into. Their lips vibrate with the air and that is what creates the sound or pitch.

Trumpets date back to around 1500 BC.

If you stretched out the tubing of a French horn it would measure over twelve feet (that's over 3.5 metres!)

Meet Our Magician...Patrick King!

Patrick King has a trick up his sleeve... Not only is he the dazzling magician you'll see in Big Top Brass, but he's also a musician! Alongside his role as timpanist at the London Symphony Orchestra, he is Head of Percussion at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama. Patrick was percussion finalist in the BBC Young Musician of the Year in 2001, and winner of the London Symphony Orchestra St Luke's Academy.

As an educator, Patrick has tutored the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain and has given masterclasses throughout the UK. He is artistic director of Children's Musical Adventures, a company devoted to music for young people, and an ambassador for The Benedetti Foundation. He is passionate about spreading the joy of music.

After many years of practise, and many exams (much like becoming a musician!), Patrick was accepted into The Magic Circle, which is the most famous magic society in the world. But don't be tempted to ask the secret to his magic...he'll only tell you: "a true magician never reveals their secrets!".
