2024/25

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It's certainly been a Season of celebration with some notable milestones, magical moments and positive changes.

2024/25 saw us mark 30 years in the business of bringing joy to young people and their families through orchestral music. Performances have stayed true to our initial mission; providing innovative, high-quality, and child-centred experiences (for young people age 4-12), and this Season's offerings were bolder and brighter than ever before. We travelled haunted corridors of concert halls, blasted into space, explored the natural world back on Earth – all while highlighting the storytelling and universal power of music that connects us all.

Feedback speaks for itself, and we're fortunate to be able to listen closely for more via our Family Forum, which has attracted 22 new sign-ups - an honest, loyal and enthusiastic group. As well as getting to know our audience, our staff team has also enjoyed training opportunities in areas relating to accessibility, Decision Science and social value measurement, plus finding a new home (office) in the heart of Glasgow City Centre.

Headline news came in January when Creative Scotland announced their support for CCC by granting us Multi-Year Funding for the first time in our history. We're hugely grateful for the security to plan ahead for activity that really engages, and the fantastic endorsement for our future.





Equivalent to 63% of CCC's live audience in 2024/25, our flagship RSNO performances were a hit, with ticket sales 11% higher than in 2023/24.

Our Halloween spectacular came recommended by Classic FM and included a new commission by Claire McCue, brilliantly performed by the RSNO Children's Chorus. A screen above the orchestra offered scope for creativity, such as the animation of children's drawings, provided by students at the University of the West of Scotland (UWS), as has become tradition. Backstage footage of CCC's Artistic Director and Presenter, Owen Gunnell, was shown at key points, helping to bring the plot to life. Owen, seemingly unaware of ghostly sightings (provided by dancers from The Manor School of Ballet) came up against the culprits during the penultimate piece (Dies Irae from Symphonie Fantastique - Berlioz), setting off a hilarious attempt to escape them and save the concert halls as a 'Ghostbuster'.

Paul Whittaker OBE, delivered BSL interpretation, very much as part of the narrative as he hid from the spooky figures that were obvious to him (and missed by Owen)! The audience were on their feet for a game of musical statues and again at the finale for standing ovations.

Two further guest artists helped us celebrate the spirit of Christmas through a retelling of Charles Dickens' festive tale: newly graduated actors from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, Connor Fallan and Alistair Robertson, as Scrooge and Bob Cratchit, who gave dynamic performances. Booking data suggests that around 20% of families attend both RSNO concerts - to boost this figure in 2025/26, we're trialling a 10% off 'bundle' offer.

Freelance musicians selected for our Essential Orchestra know that genuinely having fun on stage is the best way to inspire. Their smiles, laughter and energy were on display during our latest concert, *Honey, I Shrunk the Orchestra* – which drew the largest audience in Aberdeen (818) since early 2020. The concept was designed to put the orchestra under the microscope revealing the inner workings of each section and highlighting the smallest instruments capable of big sounds (e.g., the piccolo and piccolo trumpet). It was also intended to showcase a 'music and nature' theme and encourage age-appropriate dialogue around the environment.

Set/costumes created a musical garden - music stands were ivy-clad, watering cans and flowers decorated the stage, and umbrellas hung from the lighting rig.

Waggle Dance by rising female composer, Aileen Sweeney, received its premiere in Dundee. The cheerful and frenzied melodies (with a traditional Scottish flair) were passed between sections of the orchestra, much like worker bees in the hive, and young children were spontaneously dancing in the aisles.


The beloved musical story for children by Prokofiev, performed by CCC's Wind Quintet, (plus a variety of pieces that conjure the imagination) proved popular at Corn Exchange, Haddington. It was our first time at the venue, and the team were immediately in touch to arrange a repeat visit next spring as a co-promotion. Due to demand, we ran two showings of the concert in both St Andrews (Laidlaw Music Centre) and Perth (Theatre), welcoming fully intergenerational audiences – from babies to great grandparents. We were close to selling out across the board – reaching 97% capacity on average. 44% of our surveyed audience told us they booked to provide something cultural for their family.

Young woodwind and percussion players under instruction at Perth & Kinross Instrumental Service, were invited to the rehearsal in Perth.

A bassoonist in S₃ at Blairgowrie High School was particularly appreciative: "Thanks so much, it's been really cool to see backstage and how things work – I heard sections of lots of the pieces and everyone testing different dynamic levels for balance and really enjoyed talking to the musicians."

Fulfilling our pledge to integrate digital work into our Season, (ensuring wider access free of financial and geographical barriers), we publicised material devised in 2023/24, and created new content for release this autumn.

Django's Journey - launched in 2024/25

Our *Django's Journey* film (focusing on the Gypsy Jazz genre and how sounds travel/adapt between cultures) plus an accompanying learning resource was made available via our social media platforms, and Education Scotland's website. We hosted an inaugural film premiere event at Citizen M in Glasgow, inviting musicians, the Board, our staff team and Family Forum members on 7 September 2024. It has since been viewed in 29 out of Scotland's 32 Local Authorities.


The *Django's Journey* resource, and our *Roving Reviewers* activity pack combined address numerous Curriculum for Excellence outcomes: eleven for Literacy; nine Expressive Arts; four Social Studies; three Health and Wellbeing and one for Modern Languages.

"I'm using Roving Reviewers here in Kintyre, Argyll and Bute, to help with my personal enquiry as a student teacher about how to get music into schools for non-musicians...This is definitely something any teacher could use and the children are engaged, asking questions and wanting to listen to more music. 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Misterstourworm - created in 2024/25 (for release in 2025/26)

Sanjeev Kohli, well known for his comedy role in Still Game, gave a rather more serious performance to narrate the Orcadian legend of a sinister sea-serpent in our latest concert film, *Misterstourworm*. Recorded at Clockwork Studios during November 2024 and edited in February 2025, it is due for public release in September (along with versions featuring BSL interpretation, Gaelic translation and animated subtitles). Aimed at a slightly older age group (7+), the film showcases the mystical orchestral work by Savourna Stevenson set to words by Stuart Paterson, as well as traditional Scottish music.

Our resource (of the same name) relating to the film, will provide step-by-step activities designed to encourage active listening skills and individuality.

My Instrument and Me is a further resource that has been created to aid recruitment and retention for Instrumental Music Services. It features professional demo videos and short 'peer reviews' as to the benefits and qualities specific instruments have, and why children have chosen to learn them.

We strengthened our relationship with Dunard Primary in Maryhill (Glasgow), where 55% of children live in the most deprived areas (SIMD 1-2). The school has a multicultural population with around 25 different languages being spoken. CCC musicians delivered 30 sessions (up from 21 last year) providing an element of "consistency and community" which was extremely valued. CCC's Artistic Director became a familiar face, with many pupils passing him in the hallway with a "Hey Owen", or "Hi music man!" They would frequently seek him out between sessions for a chat or an opportunity to play the marimba.

Four enthusiastic pupils were selected to pilot a workshop session and meet with professional musician and artist, Kirsty Matheson to produce a 10-minute film that forms an integral part of the *Misterstourworm* resource.

ACTIVITY IN ADDITIONAL SCHOOLS:

CCC musician and artist Kirsty Matheson encouraged pupils to discover how music can represent colours and emotions - supporting self-expression in abstract formats. Participants were encouraged to make marks on the page to rhythm at first, then melody – building to paintings/drawings based on excerpts from *Mars* and *Venus* (Holst's *The Planets*). The key message shared was that there's no 'right', 'wrong', 'good' or 'bad' – only individual/authentic responses. A participant in Inveraray with Autism who usually struggles with attendance beyond lunchtime chose to stay because he was so engaged with the art workshop. Another told CCC staff that it was his "best day ever at school".

In the week leading to the *Peter and the Wolf* concerts in Perth, CCC musicians delivered 15 interactive workshops across the Local Authority (stretching 33 miles Northwest and 24 miles South of Perth, to engage pupils (P3-7) – the vast majority of whom were not learning an instrument. Our post-project survey (representing 68 pupils) indicated that 100% would like a return visit from CCC. We were rated 4.3 out of 5 for delivery.

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OTHER ACHIEVEMENTS

EQUITY, DIVERSITY & INCLUSION

- British Sign Language (BSL) interpretation was given at nine performances, where narration/song featured. Peter and the Wolf in Perth saw the return of one loyal Deaf audience member for the 4th time who told us that Anne Whittaker's signing transformed the experience for them.
- We showcased female talent through all strands: composers, performers and workshop leaders
- Ticket prices remained comparatively low our audience survey rated our affordability 4.2 out of 5
- → 730 free tickets were offered (5% more than last Season) via our social inclusion network of charities, including for a new partnership with Glasgow Women's Aid.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

- → 61% of our surveyed audience travelled either by walking/cycling, public transport, or hybrid/electric car.
- We are committed to improving sustainable methods of touring providing buses to encourage group travel, or booking concert venues/times based on train options for musicians.
- Staging/props for Honey, I Shrunk the Orchestra had either been recycled from previous productions, or purchased/made for repeated use in future projects, with the help of Cue Props – who operate from a sustainable perspective.
- Our membership of the Scottish Classical Sustainability Group continues. We are currently researching ways to minimise our digital footprint and our findings will inform planning for a new website.

DIGITAL PROGRESS

We continue our commitment to the development of CCC's digital output and progress. With the increased production of activities (including the upcoming *Misterstourworm* film and resource and *My Instrument and Me*), we are developing a loyal online base. The increase of film footage and digital assets which we have built up over the last two years has been hugely beneficial to this progress.






WHATS'S NEXT IN 2025/26

High-level themes (as per our Business Plan to 2028) will focus on nature/the environment and self-expression, as we deliver:

- 14 concerts (Strands 1-3) in Aberdeen, Banchory, Dundee, Edinburgh, Giffnock, Glasgow, Haddington, Inverness, Perth and St Andrews
- A new film (see below), plus two digital learning resources (Strand 4)
- Work with Gaelic and refugee communities, as well as in healthcare settings (Strand 5)

THE STORY COLLECTOR

CCC is set to empower children in the creative driving seat – helping to shape our next family programme. Assigned a season-of-the-year theme, approx. 80 young people will explore personal experiences of living in Scotland – uncovering memories of celebrations and annual traditions. Owen Gunnell and composer, Aileen Sweeney, along with a trusted freelance musician, and a practitioner from the Village Storytelling Centre, will offer hands-on activities that promote confidence, hone listening skills and help the children to connect, share, and make music together.

A single narrative will then be created from material gathered that reflects both the individuality and collective voice of participants. This will form the basis of a commission by Aileen for chamber ensemble (12 musicians) plus narrator – sitting at the heart of our next concert film.
